1. ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA AND INTRODUCTION OF THE MEETING STRUCTURE AND THE NEW APE BUREAU

The meeting's agenda is unanimously adopted by the participants.

2. VALIDATION OF THE MINUTES FROM THE 2 DECEMBER MEETINGS

The minutes of the meetings held on 2 December 2025, were approved by the members present.

3. DECLARATION OF POTENTIAL CONFLICT OF INTEREST

No declaration of a conflict-of-interest situation was made by the members.

4. FINANCE COMMISSION

The Finance Committee met on Monday, 15 December to review the 2026 budget, which will be submitted for approval to the LFIB Conseil d'Administration as well as to the Foundation's Conseil d'Administration at their respective meetings scheduled for Friday, 19 December. This is a particularly important and sensitive exercise, given the current financial challenges facing the school.

The Administrative and Financial Director recalls that the vote on tuition fees for the 2026–2027 academic year has a major budgetary impact on the 2027 calendar year. Since the school year begins in September, only four months fall within the 2026 calendar year, compared with six months in 2027. As a result, the Conseil d'Administration is required to vote on approximately 40% of the 2026 budget and 60% of the 2027 budget. This requires forward planning, particularly with regard to staff-related expenses and various allowances. This budget represents an important step for LFIB, marking the achievement of a new stage in its development.

Several structural factors explain this evolution. First, the lease renegotiation with the property owners, the financial impact of which has been prudently anticipated. Second, several major contracts reaching their expiry date are subject to new calls for tender, particularly those relating to school catering, cleaning services, and the outsourcing of gardening services, the latter reflecting the desire to improve site maintenance. Finally, the French government's public finance consolidation policy has led to a reduction in the coverage of civil service pensions by the AEFÉ, with an estimated impact of 5.8 million THB from July 2026 and 17 million THB in 2027, placing significant pressure on the school's budget.

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Despite these constraints, several positive factors provide a solid foundation for this budget. Enrolment figures are projected to increase, a 4% rise in tuition fees has already been incorporated, budget monitoring is rigorous, and the school has no outstanding debt. In addition, a provisioning system for retirement indemnities helps offset the financial impact of staff departures. Particular attention has also been paid to hygiene, safety, maintenance, and repair issues, as the school buildings are more than twenty years old, which requires a strengthened maintenance policy.

Expenditure

Purchases

For the purchases chapter, the change between 2025 and 2026 remains limited. This stability is mainly due to better control of electricity and utilities expenses, made possible by repair work and investments carried out on the facilities. Educational expenses, amounting to approximately 21 million THB, remain stable. A slight increase is nevertheless observed in maintenance supplies, due to a greater share of maintenance work being handled directly by the school's staff.

Subcontracting and External Services

This item shows a more significant increase. A rise is anticipated in security and cleaning contracts, particularly due to the increase in the minimum wage in Thailand. Rent has also been projected upwards, pending the outcome of negotiations with the property owners. Maintenance allocations are increasing by 1.5 million THB to enable the completion of major works, such as repainting the kindergarten, several primary classrooms, and the agora, as well as floor repairs and other interventions necessary to preserve the buildings.

Other External Services

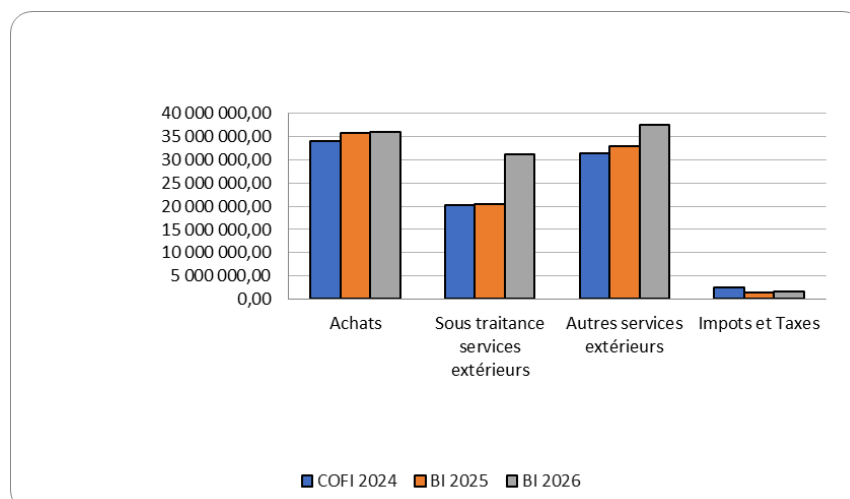
An increase in school catering expenses is also expected, linked to rising enrolment numbers. In addition, a comprehensive audit of the electrical installations is planned, including the inspection of every electrical outlet, in order to ensure compliance with current safety standards.

Taxes and Duties

Regarding taxes and duties, no significant changes are to be reported.

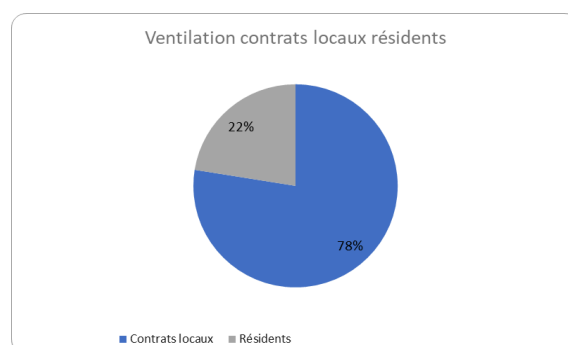
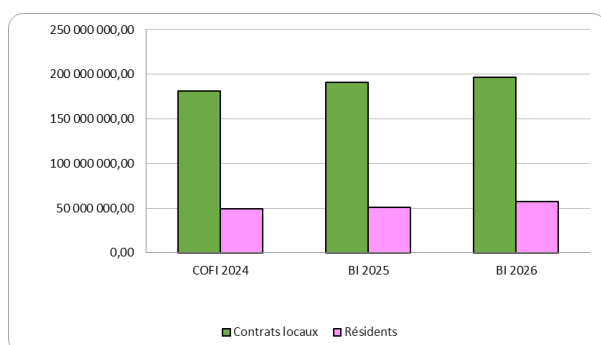
Staff Costs

Staff costs, which constitute the main area of expenditure, represent nearly half of the budget. Local contracts show only a limited increase, below 2.86%, notably thanks to the AEFÉ's coverage of an additional management position. In contrast, resident staff costs are rising more significantly, mainly due to the new partial coverage of civil service pensions by schools, resulting in an overall increase of approximately 11.57% for this item.

In order to support enrolment growth, particularly at lower secondary level (collège), the creation of 24 additional hours for educational assistants is planned, along with the creation of an additional half-time position in primary school, in order to improve supervision, student support, and the organisation of school and extracurricular time.

Tuition Fee Reductions

Tuition fee reductions are maintained for large families, school staff, as well as under financial aid schemes and coverage of school trips for scholarship students. A new sponsorship initiative is also being introduced to support enrolment in kindergarten, offering a 10% reduction on the tuition fees of the youngest child for parents who sponsor two new students from two different families.

Scholarships

The scholarship allocation corresponds to the decisions of the first scholarship committee, with no budget overrun identified at this stage.

Exceptional Expenses

Exceptional expenses remain very limited, reflecting rigorous management and an effective policy for the recovery of outstanding payments.

Depreciation and Provisions

As the Foundation has no independent financial resources, an accounting entry is made to balance the Foundation's accounts without impacting consolidated cash flow. Depreciation is increasing, in line with the scale of investments carried out and planned on the school buildings. Provisions for retirement indemnities are decreasing, following the departure of former employees.

Overall, the budget amounts to more than 489 million THB, representing an overall growth of 9%, and 7.5% excluding scholarships. After a transitional year marked by more moderate growth, this budget reflects a significant growth phase for the school.

Revenue

Tuition fees remain the school's main source of revenue. They are expected to increase by an estimated 37 million THB between 2024 and 2026, and by 32 million THB compared with the 2025 budget. This growth is explained by the 4% fee increase applied the previous year, the proposed fee increase for the 2026 school year, and a slight rise in enrollment. The total budget is expected to increase by 28%, reaching approximately 460 million THB, marking a significant leap compared with previous years.

Enrolment is projected at 1,052 students on 1 January, 1,049 students on 1 April, and 1,067 students on 1 September, compared with 1,057 students in September 2025, representing an estimated net gain of around 10 students. However, this overall trend conceals disparities between levels: a slight decline is anticipated in primary school, in line with trends observed in other accredited schools in Bangkok, while lower secondary (collège) is expected to continue growing, with an estimated increase of around twenty students. Upper secondary (lycée) numbers remain stable at around 200 students.

School lunch revenue is also increasing, driven by both higher enrolment, particularly among lower secondary students, and adjustments to catering fees. In contrast, registration fees remain cautiously projected, as new enrolments remain an area of vigilance for the school, particularly among Thai families, whose numbers have significantly declined in recent years.

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Other service revenues include educational, extracurricular and after-school activities (sports activities, homework support, school trips, etc.). In this context, it is proposed to increase the fees for the international section in secondary school, which have remained unchanged for several years, in order to reflect rising costs.

Ancillary revenues, such as parking rentals and event hosting, remain broadly balanced. However, a decrease is anticipated in 2026 due to the organisation of fewer large-scale events.

Scholarships and grants are incorporated on the basis of the amounts approved by the relevant committees. The subsidy provided by the AEFÉ notably covers the funding of a half-time secretarial position for the IEN.

Ms TIAR questions the school Management regarding communication about the fee increases and the information provided to families in advance, highlighting issues of trust, clarity, and the school's attractiveness. The school Management recalls that the budget constitutes a governance decision, while indicating that strengthened communication would be implemented, focusing on transparency regarding completed and upcoming projects, particularly in the areas of safety, hygiene, maintenance, and service improvement, in order to better demonstrate how families' contributions are being used.

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Investments

Regarding investments, Mr MONIER indicates that the school's investment capacity amounts to 32 million THB, corresponding to the total amount that can be committed. Of this envelope, 26,872,500 THB will be allocated to investment projects, in line with the commitments made at the last APE meeting.

A significant share of these investments concerns digital infrastructure. A budget of approximately 8,249,500 THB is dedicated to IT equipment in order to maintain a high level of network security and performance. A new equipment policy is being implemented, prioritising the use of laptops and Chromebooks in classrooms, gradually replacing desktop computers. The computer room and the study hall will be re-equipped to ensure easier access to digital tools for students. The replacement of interactive projectors is also planned, particularly within the framework of the internal training programme "La Ruche."

A further 15,523,000 THB is allocated to construction and renovation works. In particular, the creation of a space including toilets and showers near the stadium is planned, in order to meet the needs of PE teachers and improve facilities for the public during sporting events. Floor repairs will be carried out in several areas, especially in spaces presenting risks related to water stagnation, in kindergarten to improve access to certain play areas, as well as in the agora.

The renovation of the secondary school infirmary is also scheduled. This will include a complete reorganisation of the space, the creation of a shower area, the installation of a reception counter, and improved separation of spaces in order to enhance student care. Works are also planned around the canteen and in the outdoor area of the kindergarten, including the replacement of worn artificial grass and the installation of new playground equipment compliant with current safety standards.

The refurbishment of the kiosks located at the school entrance is being considered, depending on the outcome of the ongoing call for tenders. Security improvements are also planned, notably upgrading the fire alarm system to interconnect it with existing safety devices. An initial sustainable development initiative will be undertaken with the installation of solar lamps in the parking area. In addition, waterproofing works are scheduled on the canteen roof to address leaks and protect previous investments.

Regarding sports facilities, the flooring of the weight training room will be replaced for safety and comfort reasons, and certain equipment will be reinforced. The renovation of primary school toilets will continue, with work planned in two additional areas located near the BCD (library) and on the ground floor. A harmonisation of secondary school furniture is also planned to reduce disparities between older equipment and more recently acquired furniture.

Mr MONIER specifies that the works are scheduled progressively, taking school holiday periods into account in order to minimise disruption to the school's operations. Some projects may begin as early as the Christmas holidays, particularly in kindergarten to secure access areas.

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In response to a question from Mr CASSONNET regarding works that might not be completed within the planned timeframe, Mr MONIER indicates that they are generally postponed to the following year. Substitute actions may also be implemented where possible, as the school maintains a priority list enabling adjustments to the works schedule.

5. HR COMMISSION

The HR Committee met on 11 December to review requests for extensions of professional activity. These requests concern staff members who have reached the statutory retirement age for civil servants, set at 60 years old, and who wish to continue working. In accordance with the school's internal regulations, a one-year extension may be granted annually up to the age of 67, upon submission of a reasoned request to the HR Committee.

After reviewing the files and in the absence of any specific contraindications, nine requests for extension of activity, concerning teachers, were examined and approved. In addition, one request for sabbatical leave was also reviewed and validated.

Regarding recruitment, since the last meeting, the recruitment of a primary school English teacher has been finalized, as the offer has been accepted. Two other recruitments are

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nearing completion: that of a Head of Communication and that of a Purchasing Officer. Interviews have been conducted and offers have been made, pending confirmation and the necessary signatures. A recruitment process is also underway to replace an FLSCO teacher during maternity leave.

Upcoming recruitments are also discussed. The recruitment of educational assistants will be launched during January, with the aim of taking up duties in February, in order to enable their participation in training scheduled for early February.

Mr. REAUD reminds the committee that the busiest recruitment period generally falls between March and May, when staff departures are confirmed and the HR Committee is particularly in demand.

6. CANTEEN COMMISSION

A presentation about the canteen will be held on 18 December at 8:15 a.m. for families who have enrolled since January 2025. This initiative is primarily intended to inform families who have recently joined LFIB. Twenty-three families have registered.

The presentation will take place in the Polyvalante room and will begin with an approximately fifteen-minute introduction covering how the canteen operates, the role of the canteen committee, and the organization of lunch periods for primary and secondary students, in coordination with the outsourced catering provider. Families will then be invited to visit the canteen and meet the head chef, who will explain how the service operates and the practices that have been implemented.

The visit is scheduled to end at 9:30 a.m. to allow preparation for student lunch service. Families of kindergarten pupils who have not yet visited the kindergarten canteen will be offered a specific tour before leaving. This initiative, in place for four years, has significantly reduced the number of inquiries and complaints by proactively addressing many practical questions from families.

Regarding suspected cases of food poisoning, it is recalled that the school has a freezer separate from those of the service provider Epicure, dedicated to the daily storage of meal samples. Following a recent report from a family concerning suspected food poisoning affecting their child, all meal samples from that day's menu were sent to a laboratory for analysis, and the results are currently pending. Internal procedures were applied in accordance with existing protocols, with the aim of conducting a factual verification of the situation and identifying any possible cause.

Depending on the results, discussions will be initiated with the catering provider to analyze the causes and, if necessary, strengthen existing procedures. It is specified that communication will be directed first and foremost to the family who alerted the school.

Mr. CASSONNET raises the question of the school's responsibility and the role of the provider, noting that although catering is managed by an external company, the canteen is located within the school premises, and families naturally identify the school as their primary point of

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contact. The school Management reiterates its commitment to maintaining a high level of oversight of the provider's practices, particularly through regular checks and the use of tender procedures. This approach aims to guarantee food quality and safety while avoiding a relationship based solely on contractual trust.

The committee emphasizes the importance of clear and reassuring communication to families, especially in sensitive situations. It is essential to highlight the preventive, monitoring, and follow-up measures in place to ensure student safety, while acknowledging parents' legitimate concerns.

The next canteen committee meeting is scheduled for 29 January at 9:00 a.m. On that occasion, the specifications for the upcoming call for tenders for school catering services will be presented and reviewed. Committee members will be involved in the process and will participate in the selection panel in order to provide input and feedback before the document is published.

7. CONSTRUCTIONS COMMISSION

No specific activity has taken place recently within the school. However, it is proposed to schedule a meeting on 22 January at 9:00 a.m. in order to provide an overall update on all planned works projects, in connection with the budget that will have been voted on.

This meeting will make it possible to set priorities, identify the actions to be undertaken, and work on the different phases of project implementation.

8. COMMUNICATION COMMISSION

The Communication Committee met on 3 December. A presentation was delivered by the Communication manager.

The next committee meeting is scheduled for 10 February 2026, at 2:30 p.m. As the current Communication manager will be leaving the school by then, committee members will have the opportunity to meet the new person who will take over these responsibilities.

9. AES COMMISSION

Since the last meeting, the AES Committee has not met. As part of the Open House event, it is proposed to organize a meeting on 16 January at 8:30 a.m. in order to validate the actions to be carried out ahead of the opening of registrations for Semester 2 on 30 January.

It is also planned to circulate a short survey among families and staff to gather their feedback, particularly to assess positive aspects and identify any areas for improvement. These elements will help adjust actions, validate the Semester 2 schedule, and continue the ongoing reflection on the initiatives implemented.

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10. TRANSPORT COMMISSION

No specific matters were discussed during the committee meeting. However, the next meeting is scheduled for 5 February at 9:00 a.m.

By that time, Montri will have received the results of the survey conducted among users and will be able to share them. The survey results may be circulated in advance and will be presented and discussed during the next meeting.

11. ANY OTHERS BUSINESS

Mrs. TIAR asks the school management about the departure of certain families and whether satisfaction surveys are conducted to identify the reasons. Mr. MONIER explains that the re-enrollment rate remains high, particularly among families whose children have been enrolled since kindergarten, who largely remain loyal to the school. However, a decline in new enrollments from Thai families has been observed, which has been identified as a key area for strengthening communication efforts.

It is also highlighted that overall enrollment numbers are increasing compared to the previous year, with approximately thirty additional students. This result is notably due to a strong re-enrollment rate and families' satisfaction with the educational approach offered.

Mrs. TIAR also raises the issue of school rankings, noting that LFIB is ranked 37th. Mrs. MESSEGHEM clarifies that this ranking concerns the category of small high schools and should be interpreted in light of the number of students presented for the baccalaureate and the indicators used. The school has a 100% success rate, with a high number of honors distinctions, reflecting the pedagogical excellence recognized within the network.

Mrs. TIAR further suggests considering the implementation of surveys among families, particularly regarding extracurricular or sports activities, in order to gather their feedback on organization and better take their expectations into account. Such an approach would help strengthen dialogue with parents and improve existing arrangements.

Regarding the approval of school trips, it is recalled that parent representatives elected to the APE Bureau who participate in the Conseil d'Administration are also invited to attend the School Council, ensuring they have access to all necessary information prior to voting. As the minutes of the School Council are public, they also provide transparent access to discussions and decisions.
